


Synopsis

LITTLE WOMEN tells the much-beloved story of the four March girls. Meg, Jo. Beth and Amy, as they grow to adulthood in 19th-century New England. At the start of the play, pretty, practical Meg, rebellious, head-strong Jo, shy, hardworking Beth and spoiled little Amy are faced with the prospect of a dreary Christmas the year their father is away at war. Money is tight, and what they do have the family shares with their even poorer neighbors. But the girls are resourceful, and they can never be really poor when they have each other.

As the year progresses, the girls have many domestic adventures. They meet Laurie, "that Lawrence boy," who lives in the immense house next door. He and his grandfather become good neighbors and friends, and Laurie seems to be falling for Jo. Meanwhile, Jo embarks on a writing career, publishing a story in the local newspaper. The girls all experience social triumphs and disasters as they try to find their place in the world.

Tragedy strikes the family when Mr. March is struck ill in Washington and Mrs. March must fly to his side. Left to fend for themselves the girls learn much about responsibility. While nursing sick neighbor children, Beth contracts scarlet fever. She recovers, but the disease leaves her permanently weak. Act one ends with the joyful return of Mr. March, and the surprising engagement of Meg and John Brook, Laurie's tutor. Exactly one year has gone by.

Act Two opens several years later and covers a much longer time period, as the girls are now grown up. We witness Meg's marriage to John Brook. Jo leaves Concord for New York because she fears Laurie has feeling for her that she can't return. There she meets kindly Professor Bhaer. Amy travels to Europe with Aunt March, where she meets a despondent Laurie, come abroad to drown his sorrows over Jo's rejection.

Jo returns home to find Beth dying. When the inevitable happens, a hole is left in the family that can never be filled. But happiness is still in store. The news of Beth's death, when it reaches them in Europe, brings Amy and Laurie together and allows them to discover feelings other than friendship. They return to Concord as man and wife. It begins to look at if Jo is destined for spinsterhood, but her friend Professor Bhaer pursues her to New England and offers himself to her. The play closes with the whole family together in warmth and love.

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Letter From the Superintendent

It is interesting that the use of the "focus group" was employed as far back as 1868 to determine the possible success of a literary work. Louisa May Alcott, author of Little Women, found it difficult to produce the chapters of a book intended for young girls. During the production of Little Women Alcott writes in her diary, "I plod away although I don't enjoy this sort of thing." At the conclusion of the writing of the book both Alcott and her publicist, Thomas Niles, judged Little Women "dull."



However, Niles young niece, Lille Almy, found the chapters most enjoyable and the book was then provided to a group of Lille's young friends for age testing. The girls found the literary work delightful. Validated by a focus group of young girls, the stories of Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy (Little Women) went to press and became an international best seller for decades thereafter. Today, the book and the stage production delight people of all ages.

There is no need to test the appeal of Royal Oak High School Drama Club presentations. Year after year, our drama students produce some of the best theatre in the City of Royal Oak. Relax, sit back and prepare to be entertained! And don't forget to provide ample applause for the efforts of our young entertainers.

Little Women, the novel, is too much story for one play. This timeless classic is so interwoven into the fabric of our memories that no one can put it all onstage at one time. We can't show every nuanced narrative that Louisa May Alcott expressed in her quintessential American work, so we should not try. Instead, we have tried to bring you the heart of the story: the tale of love and learning, of loss, and of the redemption of time that comes through the lives of the indelible March family.



I guess I got lucky when I found a very well-crafted play by Marian De Forest that was a hit on the Broadway and London stages, 100 years ago. That told

me a lot, because none of the newer stage versions you can find out there ever made it to Broadway. And it also struck me that that particular production was "arranged" by the most famous stage actress of her day, Jessie Bonstelle. Yes, Bonstelle. That's the same lady who, legend has it, still haunts the Bonstelle Theatre at my alma mater, Wayne State. And, since this high school is also my alma mater, I thought maybe Jessie could borrow our theatre to haunt with her blessings of talent.

But mostly, I knew of some deeply talented students here at Royal Oak who were ready for the serious ensemble work this play calls for. Not just onstage, but the light crew, sound screw, stage crew and stage managers, props and costumes crews too. I know I speak for all the students when I give special thanks to Drama Club teacher adviser Noelle Ochoa for her steadfast support and educational guidance.

And I know I speak for Ms. Ochoa when I tell you that these Drama Club students make me proud. I'm sure they'll make Jessie Bonstelle proud.

And now, watch them make you proud too.



Cassie Haglund, Publicity Leader, Sophomore


